NATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING HELD AT LANGEBAAN COUNTRY ESTATE

8 – 11 SEPTEMBER 2011

With the exception of the following Regions:- Free State, Northern Free State, Northern Cape and Sections Botswana and Mozambique who apologized for not being represented, all other Regions were present.

The West-Coast and Western Cape Regions played host to all the Delegates, observers and visitors.

Of the important matters on the Agenda was the proposed Amendment and Consolidation of the IPA (SA Constitution in conjunction with the International IPA Statutes, Rules and Directives. This proposal was unanimously approved by the Council Members.

We for once have everything pertaining to IPA matters in one book. It will no longer be asked how we handle this matter. Be assured many hours of hard work was put in by the National Executive Committee and National Council members before it was approved. Internationally the amendments were also accepted. Under the Chairmanship of Vossie Vos 2nd Vice President responsible for IPA (SA) Guest Houses a House Managers meeting was held where a new House Managers directive was proposed and approved. I

As in the past, there was once again spoken about the IPA Growth with in South Africa. This is a concern throughout the IPA world notwithstanding the fact that internationally we have passed the 400 000 thousand membership mark.

Communication amongst National Regions and Branches here and internationally remains a problem. We have a monthly newsletter but if you do not receive news from Regions or other members then you have nothing to write about. Without communication we as National, Regions or Branches will just fade away. Thank you for those who make effort in sending news. During our Gala evening we were honoured to have Lt-Genl. Lamoer, Provincial Commissioner of the Western Cape as a guest speaker. Genl. Lamoer is an IPA member and his enthusiasm for the organization was heart-warming and he was also concerned about the IPA growth particularly in the Western Cape.

The Gala evening is also used to pay tribute to individual members who were recommended by their Regions for exceptional services towards IPA. The recipients in no specific order were:-

Vusi Mcaba elected as vice chairman of IPA Meeuland Branch – West Coast Region for his contribution in promoting sport amongst IPA and SAPS members.

EMBLEMS OF THE INTERNATIONAL
POLICE ASSOCIATION.



As the Founder of The International Police Association, I wish to put on official record the fact that, after the foundation of the Association on 1st January, 1950, it was decided by pioneer members of the I.P.A. in Great Britain that we should have an emblem and motto to identify the Association. A number of ideas were put forward, but it was left to me to design the actual emblem.

I had to include a central globe, to show the worldwide scope of the I.P.A. I double-circled this with the title, "International Police Association", within. Then I used the eight-pointed star, which is the background to most British Police Force helmet badges. To complete the effect, laurel leaves were added either side of the star motif, with a scroll at the base of the design, which would bear the motto of the Association, "Servo Per Amikeco", which derives from the International language Esperanto. This translated into English is "Service Through Friendship". Stationery was produced with this emblem from 1950 onwards, and I had lapel and blazer badges produced. These items were used by the pioneer member countries of Great Britain, Holland, Belgium, Norway, France, Germany, Switzerland and Ireland.

At the 1st International Congress of the Association in Paris in 1955, the original seven National Sections came together to approve International Statutes, to elect International officers, and to decide on matters relevant to the Association. It was decided here that the emblem that I had designed would be adopted as the official emblem of the Association. A second design would consist only of the roundel with the letters "I.P.A." at the top, with the motto "Servo Per Amikeco" at the base, and the globe in the centre. The colours used were red for the land mass, yellow for the words, roundel and star with light blue for the sea on the globe and dark blue in the circle and scroll.

After possible abuse of our emblem, it was decided to copyright the design. This was done by the British Section in 1974, and other countries have done the same.

The crest, or emblem, shown on this notepaper and on the attached document is used throughout the world for all publications, letter headings, badges, plaques and other items sold solely by, or presented on behalf of, The International Police Association.

In correspondence with organisations such as The United Nations, The Council of Europe and other bodies, the emblem as previously described in fine and precise detail is well known and recognised. This should not be copied or used by other companies or organisations, anywhere in the world. They are breaching copyright laws directly if they use OUR emblem or designs and need to be firmly warned of this fact.

The emblems of the IPA are protected by copyright and may only be used within the framework of activities that are directly linked to the Association (International Rule – Article 6).

Background

Arthur Troop, the Founder of IPA, designed the IPA emblem during the 1950's.

The emblem was officially adopted at the 1st International IPA Congress held in Paris during September 1955.

The IPA emblem is protected by international copyright (1974).

The Design

The following relate to the two designs of the emblem:

The Crest Design:

The "Crest" design consists of the following:

Central globe, which is doubled circled, represents the worldwide scope of IPA and which includes the words "INTERNATIONAL POLICE ASSOCIATION";

Eight-pointed star representing police services (back then the background to most British Police Force helmet badges);

Laurel leaves either side of the star motif;

Scroll at the base bearing the IPA motto – "SERVO PER AMIKECO".



The Roundel Design:

The "Roundel" design consists of the following:

Central globe, which is doubled circled as with the "Crest design" and includes;

The words "IPA" at the top and "SERVO PER AMIKECO" at the bottom.

Design Colours

The crest or roundel may be any solid colour or if the design is multi-coloured, the following colours are to be used:

The star, roundel & words: yellow

The land mass: red

The sea: light blue

Inner circle and scroll: dark blue

Utilisation of the Emblems

The emblems of the IPA as protected by copyright may only be used within the framework of activities that are directly linked to the Association and therefore:

The IPA emblems and logos cannot not be utilised for private commercial purposes by IPA members, private persons, service providers, suppliers, etc.;

IPA Sections and Regions may use the emblems and logos only under officially expressed conditions;

Any change made to the emblems jeopardises copyright protection and is not permitted and

Nothing may enter into or through the official logo or roundel.

Safekeeping of Models

Models of the two protected forms (crest and roundel) are kept by the International Secretary General at the International Administrative Centre.
